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


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






Tamshiyacu & Esperanza

Our first skiff excursion after leaving Iquitos was the small river town of Tamshiyacu. On our way to the town our eagle-eyed guide was able to spot the Pygmy Marmoset, the smallest monkey in the world. Our morning excursion also gave us glimpses of a number of Green Tree Iguanas. In the afternoon we journeyed further south to Esperanza for some Amazon bird watching.


















































Yarapa River

Our morning skiff excursion took us just beyond the Amazon Confluence where the Amazon river diverges into the Maranon and Ucayali rivers to the small Yarapa tributary. We were able to get our first glimpses of the Three-toed Sloth as well as a number of insect and bird species.




Tapiche River





















Zapote River

On Day 5 we awoke early in the morning before breakfast to travel along the Zapote River. We saw our first glimpse of the famous Amazon Pink River Dolphins. After a picnic breakfast on the skiff we saw a number of birds including the Black-collared Hawk, a Great Black Hawk, a Great Kiskadee, a Horned Screamer, a White-throated Toucan and a flock of Neotropic Comorants. We spotted two more monkey species including the Monk Saki Monkey and a Squirrel Monkey.






























Tamana Lake

In the evening we prepared for a late night excursion within the Pacaya Samiria National Reserve. We were greeted with a host of nocturnal animals from the Great Potoo, Sand-colored Nighthawk, Ladder-tailed Nightjar to the Clown Tree Frog and the transparent Glass Tree Frog. Our guide narrowly missed catching an Amazon Water Snake but made up for it by giving us a close encounter with a young White Caiman.




Yanayche River & Dorado Creek
















Centro America
